
What is Abilympics?

Foreword

The NAAI, National Abilympics
Association of India is a sister
entity of Sarthak. Its core purpose
is to identify suitable PwD
Candidates, in specified skills; train
them; hold internal competitions,
and select the final contingent
which will compete in the global
competition of Abilympics. The
skill categories include ICT,
(Information and Communication
Technologies); Crafts; Services;
Hospitality; etc.

Under the visionary leadership of its President, Shri Krishan Kalra, and the committed and able operating team, led by Dr. Jitender Aggarwal has also been growing fast! As in Sarthak, the trained, skilled candidates of NAAI are also placed in suitable companies.

The Abilympics are held every four years. The last one took place in France, in March 2024. The 11th Abilympics will be hosted by Finland, in Helsinki in 2027. NAAl's preparations have started, well in advance. NAAl began with just two regional competitions - Northern and Southern. Since then, it has been widening its reach into Bharat's hinterland. In 2024, there will be five regional competitions - North, West, Central, South and East. A sixth may be added in 2025 — The North East.

The first Regional competition, to select the potential contestants in

Finland, 2027, was held in the North Zone, at Gurugram, on December 8-9, 2023. It had 80 participants. Of these, 22 won medals in different skill categories. There were 7 Gold, 8 Silver, and 7 bronze medals. For the participants, especially those from rural and semi-urban areas, this is valuable experience in competition formats, different levels of performance, and medals. It may inspire them to aim for Gold in Finland, if selected; and be happy with a silver; or even a bronze!

The second Regional competition, of the WR, in Goa had a welcome, added feature. It was held simultaneously with the Purple Fest, 2024 of Goa. That Fest is organised by the Disability Commissioner's Office, Goa. It got more than double the number of participants of the WR - 168. Of these, 27 got medals - 7 Gold, 9 Silver and 11 Bronze.

A new Zone has been opened this year - the Central. Held in Jabalpur, MP, in February. Not a metro. But, well known. It was an achievement to mobilize 131 participants in our very first CZ competition. 14 PwD won medals - 3 Gold, 6 Silver, 5 Bronze.

NAAI is moving systematically, and fast. Without waiting for the competitions in the East and South Zones, in October, Mentoring has

started in August for the winners of the first three Regional competitions. They are also being trained to reach international standards, in their skill. The training is through online, weekly sessions. The winners of EZ, October 3-4; and SZ, October 17-18, will also, naturally, get this training. There will also be a Boot Camp for all the regional winners, before the National Competition for Phase 1, in 15 skills, in Gurugram, December 6-7, 2024.

Needless to say, the above all India campaign is expensive. It is a national investment. NAAI is most grateful to its funding partners - the DEPwD, Department of Empowerment of PwD and the Community Development Trust of Tata Power (TPCDT). NAAI is also indebted to the Sarthak hiring partners for employing the skilled PwD.

I wish the NAAI's final candidates even greater success in the Finland 2027 Abilympics.

Message from the President


Dear NAAI Supporters,

It is with immense pride that I present the 2024 Annual Report of the National Abilympic Association of India (NAAI). This year has been truly transformative and depicts our unwavering commitment to empowering Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) through skill development, inclusion, and equal opportunities.

Building upon the success of our team at the International Abilympics in France in 2023, where 13 of our participants secured 7 medals, placing India 7th among 27 nations, we have embarked on an exciting journey of preparation for the next International Abilympics in Finland in 2027. The first phase of selections, initiated in December 2023, includes 15 skill categories across ICT, Crafts, Hospitality, and Service trades, showcasing the breadth and diversity of talent our nation possesses.

This year's regional competitions in Gurugram, Goa, Jabalpur, Jamshedpur, and Bengaluru brought together over 550 passionate PwDs, each competing fiercely and demonstrating that disability is no barrier to skill and success. The courage and resilience they exhibit continue to inspire us all, proving that our collective efforts to promote inclusivity are bearing fruit.

We also bolstered partnerships with pivotal stakeholders, from government bodies to NGOs and corporate partners, ensuring a comprehensive and supportive ecosystem for PwD skill development. Expert trainers from academia and industry joined hands with us, enabling PwDs to sharpen their skills and make strides toward meaningful employment. However, much more needs to be done to expand awareness about the Abilympics and to highlight the extraordinary talents within the PwD community.

Looking ahead, our focus remains steadfast on expanding skill categories for the next phase of selections, integrating an additional 15-20 skills based on the finalized categories for Finland. At the recent IAF Executive Committee meeting in Finland, NAAI advocated for the inclusion of key Leisure and Living skills, such as Embroidery, Crochet, Jewellery Making, and Hand Knitting—crucial skill areas for employment and self-employment within South Asia. This initiative has led to an additional survey to ensure a broad and inclusive selection.

As we aim for even greater achievements, we invite all our supporters to join us in this mission to empower and uplift the immense potential within our PwD community. Together, we can enable them to reach new heights! I extend my heartfelt gratitude to our invaluable partners, including the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPwD) and Tata Power, for their unwavering support. My sincere thanks to our knowledge partners—ATDC, APCA, Stratbeans Solutions, and many others—who have been integral in mentoring our candidates from across India. I am particularly grateful for the mentorship of Padma Bhushan Dr. MB Athreya and our Advisory Board members at Sarthak and NAAI, whose vision and guidance inspire us each day.

Abilympics Overview

Abilympics, or the "Olympics of Abilities," is a vocational competition designed to highlight the skills of PwDs. Launched in 1972 by the Japan Organization for Employment of the Elderly, Persons with Disabilities, and Job Seekers (JEED), Abilympics has become a platform for PwDs to showcase their talents. The first international Abilympics, held in Tokyo in 1981, celebrated the United Nations' International Year of Disabled Persons (IYDP). Held every four years by the International Abilympic Federation, events have taken place in Tokyo (1981), Colombia (1985), Hong Kong (1989), Australia (1995), the Czech Republic (2000), India (2003), Japan (2007), South Korea (2011), France (2016) and France (2023)

History of NAAI

Founded in May 2001 under India's Ministries of Social Justice & Empowerment and Human Resource Development, NAAI was established to represent India in the 6th Abilympics in New Delhi (2003) and future competitions. The 2003 event, held at the Indira Gandhi Indoor Stadium, drew over 1,500 participants from 33 countries. It was inaugurated by then - Prime Minister Shri Atal Bihari Vajpayee, with a special reception hosted by then-President Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam at Rashtrapati Bhawan. Since then, NAAI has expanded the Abilympics movement across India, enabling PwDs through vocational skill competitions.

NAAI and Sarthak Educational Trust Partnership

In 2020, Sarthak Educational Trust, which has provided vocational training and placement for PwDs since 2008,

officially took on the operations of NAAI. With 26 centers nationwide and a strong network of stakeholders, Sarthak has given new reach and vitality to the Abilympics mission in India. This partnership has strengthened NAAI's mission, supporting a more inclusive approach to uplift PwDs and showcase their abilities.

Timeline of Key Milestones and Achievements (FY 2023-24)

In preparation for the 11th International Abilympics in Helsinki, Finland, NAAl's activity plan for 2023 - 24 includes:

- September December 2023: Strategic planning, North Zone Competitions in Gurugram, and fundraising.
- January March 2024: West and Central Zone Competitions in Goa and capacity-building initiatives.
- April September 2024: Online training for regional winners, East & South Zone Competitions in Jamshedpur and Bengaluru.

Objectives and Call to Action

NAAI remains dedicated to skill development, social inclusion, and preparing PwDs for global platforms. Join the Abilympic movement by sponsoring, volunteering, or supporting skill competitions that highlight PwD talent. 


2024 in Review A Snapshot of Success

In 2024, the National Abilympic Association of India (NAAI) achieved remarkable strides in its commitment to empowering Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) through vocational skill-building and competitions. This year's

journey unfolded through a series of dynamic regional competitions, culminating in a powerful display of talent and inclusion across India's North, West, Central, and East zones.

North Zone Competitions - December 2023 NAAI's regional events began with the North Zone
Regional Abilympics at Sarthak's Global Resource
Centre in Gurugram on December 8-9, 2023.
Hon'ble Vice-President of India, Shri Jagdeep
Dhankhar, inaugurated the competition, which
brought together participants from Jammu &
Kashmir, Haryana, Punjab, Uttar Pradesh, and
Delhi. Prior to the event, skill experts conducted
online pre-assessments, shortlisting 100
participants. Over 76 individuals then competed
across skill categories such as ICT, Craft, Service,
and Hospitality Skills.





West Zone Competitions - January 2024 - The West Zone competitions were held in partnership with the International Purple Fest Goa 2024 from January 11-13, 2024. This event featured a notable inauguration by Dr. Mallika Nadda, President of Special Olympics Bharat, alongside Shri Subhash Phal Dessai, Hon'ble Minister for Social Welfare, Goa. Adding to the value of the competition was a Green Energy Workshop led by Tata Power, which emphasized sustainable career opportunities for PwDs. With 168 participants, the event concluded with 27 medals awarded in various categories, showcasing a growing engagement in sustainable sectors.

Central Zone Competitions - February 2024 The Central Zone Regional Abilympics, hosted at
Jawaharlal Nehru Krishi Vishwavidhyalaya in
Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh, in collaboration with
the District Administration, brought 131
participants on February 24-25, 2024. A press
conference on February 23, 2024, introduced local
media to the Abilympics movement. The event
was inaugurated by Shri Narain Singh Kushwaha,
Minister of Social Welfare, Madhya Pradesh, and
awarded 14 medals in multiple skill categories.



East Zone Competitions - October 2024 - Held in Jamshedpur, Jharkhand, on October 3-4, 2024, in partnership with TPCDT, Tata Power, and Tata Steel Foundation, the East Zone competitions attracted 103 participants. Inaugurated by Hon'ble Health Minister of Jharkhand Shri Banna Gupta, the event also hosted a 2-day Neurodiversity Summit with experiential kiosks, panel discussions, an accessible movie screening, and a yoga session, reinforcing NAAI's commitment to inclusive experiences. The competition concluded with 16 medals awarded.





South Zone Competitions - October 2024 – It began with an inspiring inauguration by Smt. Geetanjali Kirloskar, renowned philanthropist and CEEO. The event witnessed enthusiastic participation, with 81 talented PwDs competing and 17 emerging victorious, winning 2 Gold, 8 Silver, and 7 Bronze medals. Additionally, the event featured an engaging exhibition by start-ups in assistive technologies, showcasing innovations from organizations like InSightE (products for neurodivergent children), EdQueries (gamified education for special children), and CoExin Technologies (solutions for cognitive disorders). This dynamic gathering highlighted both talent and technological advancements, fostering a collaborative environment for promoting inclusivity and empowerment.

Success Stories

The 2024 Abilympics celebrated inspiring stories of PwDs, each highlighting resilience and exceptional skill:

- Leeliben Vadalia from Gujarat, a skilled tailor with a locomotor disability, won Bronze in embroidery at the West Zone competition.
- Ram Raghubir Mishra, a hearing-impaired artist from Uttar Pradesh, earned Gold in painting at the North Zone, edging closer to his dream of international representation.
- Bharti Rana, a polio survivor working as a Data Operator, discovered her passion for floral arrangements at the West Zone, securing a Gold medal.
- Chinmay from West Bengal, supported by Sarthak Educational Trust, triumphed over financial and

physical challenges to win Gold in word processing, showcasing resilience and dedication.

Regional Competitions in Numbers

- Participants: Over 560 PwDs participated across North, West, Central, East, and South Zones.
- Medals Awarded: 97 medals were awarded (23 Gold, 36 Silver, 38 Bronze).

Judges & Dignitaries

36 expert judges and numerous dignitaries contributed, making the competitions impactful.

The year 2024 underscored NAAI's role as a platform where talent, inclusion, and empowerment converge. By prioritizing skill development and expanding opportunities, NAAI continues to contribute to a more inclusive and diverse workforce across India.

Championing Skills Abilympics Highlights

In 2024, the National Abilympic Association of India (NAAI) continued to champion vocational skills and strengthen pathways to success for persons with disabilities (PwDs) across India. This year marked significant achievements across regional, national, and international levels, showcasing the exceptional talents of PwDs and empowering them to reach new heights.

Regional Abilympics Competitions

The Regional Abilympics Competitions were held across five zones - North (Gurugram, Haryana), West (Panaji, Goa), Central (Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh), East (Jamshedpur, Jharkhand), and South (Bengaluru, Karnataka) - where PwDs, including students from special schools, vocational centers, academic institutes, and NGOs, participated in diverse skill categories such as computer programming, tailoring, bakery and painting. Over 15 skill categories were represented, offering a platform for participants to exhibit and sharpen their abilities.

Following the regional competitions, a 4-day boot camp is planned in Delhi NCR to provide hands-on training and individualized coaching to the regional winners, equipping them with advanced skills in preparation for the National Competitions.



National Competitions

Scheduled for December 6-7, 2024, in Gurugram, Haryana, the National Abilympics will bring together the top performers from the regional events to compete in 15 skill categories. This two-day event serves as a launchpad for furthering the careers of PwDs, offering national recognition and exposing them to standards of skill and excellence on a larger stage. Winners will go on to represent India at the International Abilympics, showcasing their talents globally and furthering India's mission of disability skill development.

International Abilympics

As the nodal agency, NAAI represents India at the International Abilympics, held every four years to celebrate vocational skills of PwDs. India has consistently sent strong contingents to international events hosted in countries such as South Korea, Japan, and France, where participants have earned accolades and strengthened India's presence on the global stage. In 2027, NAAI will once again send participants to the International Abilympics in Helsinki, Finland, to continue championing the skills and determination of Indian PwDs.







Inspiring Journeys of Top Performers

Manoj G. Bhingare - Hailing from Burhanpur, Madhya Pradesh, Manoj lost both arms in a tragic accident at age 10 but channeled his resilience into art, creating masterpieces with his feet. His journey has been marked by numerous accolades, including the "Bal Shree Award." In 2024, he secured gold in painting at the NAAI Goa event, proving that creativity knows no limits. Manoj's story embodies the power of determination, inspiring countless others to believe in their potential.

Sriyarani - Originally from Orissa, now residing in Chhattisgarh, Sriyarani faced numerous challenges due to her 60% locomotor disability, including workplace inequality. Through training with Sarthak Educational Trust, she pursued her passion for tailoring and won a bronze medal at the NAAI Regional Competition. Her story is one of resilience and advocacy, encouraging others to strive for equality and empowerment.

Ankur Sagar - Following a life-changing car accident, Ankur defied all odds, excelling in sports and art. With encouragement from his college and Sarthak, he showcased his artistic prowess, winning gold in poster designing at the Gurugram Regional event. Ankur's journey of resilience highlights the triumph of spirit, inspiring others to pursue excellence regardless of challenges.

Naserul - From Jammu & Kashmir, this skilled hand embroiderer honed his craft from a young age, overcoming a 60% locomotor disability. A WhatsApp group led him to the NAAI event, where he won gold in hand embroidery, affirming his talent and commitment. Naserul's story shows the transformative impact of skill competitions, empowering him to represent his craft with pride.

Rameez Raja - Despite a 90% locomotor disability, Rameez pursued tailoring, honing his skills and winning silver at the NAAI event in Gurugram. With limited resources but boundless ambition, Rameez's victory in tailoring showcases his dedication and resilience, inspiring him to continue advancing his skills.

Conclusion

The journeys of these exceptional individuals reflect NAAI's mission to champion the skills and talents of PwDs, providing platforms for them to shine. The 2024 Abilympics highlights not only the talent and dedication of these competitors but also NAAI's commitment to promoting an inclusive environment where skill, creativity, and determination transcend barriers.

Measuring Success The Impact of Our Work

The National Abilympic Association of India (NAAI) made remarkable strides this year, setting the stage for the upcoming International Abilympics in Finland, 2027, through the organization of Regional Abilympics Competitions across the country. This year's regional events encompassed five major zones - North, West, Central, East, and South - and successfully engaged Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) from diverse states and districts. By integrating a broad spectrum of skill categories, these competitions not only empowered participants but also established a pipeline of talent set to represent India on the international stage.

To promote broad inclusivity and diverse participation, applications were invited online across 15 skill categories, covering areas such as ICT, Crafts, Services, and Hospitality. Through outreach efforts that included NAAI's state nodal agencies, the Sarthak IDEA NGO partners, academic institutions, and various social platforms, the call for applications reached PwDs from both urban and remote areas, facilitating wide-ranging representation from different communities.

Each applicant underwent an initial telephonic assessment to evaluate their familiarity and background in their chosen skill. This screening process, conducted by the NAAI team, not only ensured that participants were well-prepared but also served to highlight the commitment and readiness of the candidates. This preparatory phase set the stage for the high-caliber Regional Competitions.





Zone - Wise Highlights

- North Zone: With more than 270 registrations, the North Zone Competitions in Gurugram attracted participants from states such as Jammu & Kashmir, Punjab, and Delhi. From the 150 shortlisted, 76 competed, leading to 23 medal winners across various skill categories.
- West Zone: Held in conjunction with Goa's Purple
 Fest, this event received over 425 registrations, with
 168 participants showcasing their talents. This zone
 recorded the highest number of medals, with 27
 awards across skill categories, such as Poster
 Designing and Embroidery, emphasizing the region's
 diversity in skills and talent.
- Central Zone: With strong participation from Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh, the Central Zone competitions in Jabalpur saw 131 participants out of 260 registrations. The zone witnessed exceptional performances, producing 14 winners in skill areas like Photography and Floral Arrangement.
- East Zone: Supported by the Tata Group and hosted in Jamshedpur, the East Zone Competitions recorded 240 registrations from states like West Bengal and Assam. With the inclusion of events focused on

Neurodiversity Inclusion, the East Zone took a pioneering step in raising awareness, yielding 16 medal winners.

• South Zone: The South Zone saw participation from 190 candidates, with 81 competing in Bangalore, Karnataka. With 17 medal winners, this zone highlighted a strong representation across skill areas like Word Processing, Photography, and Waste Reuse.

Impact in Numbers

The Regional Competitions hosted a total of 559 PwDs, producing an impressive array of medalists: 23 Gold, 36 Silver, and 38 Bronze. These results reflect not only the skill and dedication of the participants but also NAAI's commitment to creating avenues for empowerment and representation. The events fostered an environment of inclusivity, skill development, and recognition for PwDs, laying a solid foundation for the International Abilympics.

This year's regional rounds underscored the potential of every participant and the strength of collective advocacy for PwDs. As we move closer to the international stage, NAAI remains committed to measuring success not just by medals, but by the impact on individual lives, skill-building, and the spirit of inclusion promoted across communities




